"Did you know..."

The 2022-23 school year is off to a great start! What a year it has been from a 3rd place National FFA team award to the substantial Irish Pride witnessed throughout the community as a result of our football season! The Seneca High School Board of Education has successfully navigated a pandemic, responsibly prepared for a needed gymnasium addition, and proudly overseen growth in many areas of our district. The Board has long appreciated the support of the community in its efforts and I am pleased to share some exciting information about our district in the form of, "Did you know...?".

Did you know that Seneca High School has recently made great strides to attend to student's emotional and physical well-being? SHS added a social worker to work with our students social and emotional health needs and an athletic trainer to focus on student-athlete injury prevention. Both Mrs. Samantha Leake (social worker) and Mr. Christopher Jackson (athletic trainer) have been great blessings to our students and assets to the district. From these unique positions to the professional development of our faculty and staff, Seneca High School is growing.

Did you know that Seneca High School students can graduate with almost two full years of junior college credit? Students at SHS are able to earn college credit in both our General Education and Career Technical Education programs. An additional source of Irish Pride is when the school board learns of the impact that our dual credit programs have on our graduates. Recently, a mother shared that her freshman daughter at the University of Illinois was able to register as a junior because of all the great college credit opportunities Seneca High School provided her daughter. The development of the dual credit programs at SHS was a key Board of Education supported effort to enhance the student offerings in our district.

Did you know that Seneca High School has made great energy savings improvements recently? From self-performing all LED light retrofitting throughout the entire district, to major upgrades at the West Campus, our district has greatly improved its ability to be energy efficient. Additionally, the district has upgraded several operational units such as HVAC equipment to continue to promote long-term strategic savings. The West Campus, or old High School, has hosted blood drives, weekly meetings of a community church youth group, and an adult Co-Ed volleyball league. In addition, many area youth sports teams use our West Campus facilities on evenings and weekends for athletic practices.

Did you know that the planning and preparation of the gymnasium addition project has been years in the making? Several years ago, the Board prudently created a Capital Project Fund to begin saving for the addition. As savings grew, the process continued with monthly coordinated meetings with architects and construction managers and three successful community forums to engage the community in an open and honest fashion. Proudly, the district will be able to pay for the gym addition using operating funds and no property tax bonds will be issued. Finally, the administration maintains a "gym addition blog" on our website and will continue to provide updates during the project's construction for anyone interested in learning more.

On behalf of the Board of Education, we are proud of the efforts of all stakeholders involved in the growth of Seneca High School. From engaging student's needs to professional development of our faculty, to our addition project, we are excited about our district's growth and its future. I hope you enjoyed this "Did you know section?" and we hope everyone has a wonderful holiday season.

Message from our Superintendent, Dr. Dan Stecken

"The Road to Success is Always Under Construction."

Over the past two years, previous newsletters have highlighted the work that the Board of Education and Administration has undertaken in preparation for our gymnasium addition project. In the Spring of 2022, I shared an update on our progress. Since that time, our gym planning group, consisting of Board of Education members, community members, administration, and other key stakeholders, has completed the third phase, "Construction Documents."

On August 16 2022, we held our 2nd community forum series to discuss project developments and updates. While inflationary times have impacted our planning, the district has worked diligently to prepare financially and responsibly for our project. On Tuesday November 1st, we held our bid openings and benefitted from a highly competitive process with many contractors bidding on our project. Through the guidance of our construction manager, Shales McNutt Inc., and our architects at Wold Architects & Engineers, we were excited to witness the fruits of the competitive environment. On Wednesday November 16th, the Board of Education of Seneca High School approved the bids with a 7-0 vote. We will break ground in the Spring of 2023 for our gymnasium addition with a hopeful 12-month construction timeline.

As you may recall from that last writing and our community forum, the Board of Education has been planning and saving for this needed project for several years, building its "Capital Projects" fund balance over \$7 million. The district will pay the remainder of the project balance from non-taxable debt certificates and from operating fund balances. Again, this means there will be no bonding and no increase in the property tax rate. As a matter of fact, with a December levy approval, the taxpayers of Seneca High School District 160 will see a property tax rate deduction from District 160 (See Fiscal Services Director Mrs. Stacey Gould's newsletter). When we first set out to begin this construction project, we established goals, engaging the community in the Summer of 2021 with guiding principles. Our goals have not changed in our committee's work and the entire process has been an exciting moment of IRISH PRIDE. Those previously established and current goals include:

The Guiding Principles of the Committee's Work:

Community pride in our completed end product.

Multi-use facility beyond "just a gym."

More family friendly; eliminating early morning and late evening practices.

Tournament facility with the ability to host large venues and multi-team events.

Engage the community in a transparent fashion.

Increased community access to the West Campus.

As our work has continued, I am excited to share some of our updated gymnasium photos here. You will note that the Committee wanted the building addition to blend in with the existing structure as much as possible, taking great pride in our building. Additionally, the Committee wanted a main "Competition Court" with auxiliary courts to maximize practice space to continue to be a family-friendly district. The gymnasium also features a 2-lane sprint track for our successful Strength & Conditioning classes (see Mr. Dan Baker's newsletter article) to accompany our weight room and well utilized outside track. Additionally, the current balcony of the main gymnasium will be converted to a batting cage area to be used by our softball, baseball, golf, physical education classes, and strength & conditioning programs. Finally, being roughly three years into the planning of this project, I wanted to remind our taxpayers that our website features a "Gym Blog" that has early plans, pictures, and will offer ongoing progress photos and meeting notes to make the process as transparent and community engaging as possible. This project is an exciting phase in the growth of our district, one that our students, employees, and community can be extremely proud of, continuing our efforts along The Seneca Way with great IRISH PRIDE!

From the Desks of Fiscal Service Director, Stacey Gould & SRO, Ken Sangsto

The start of fall in the business office marks the time of year for two of the most important items on the to-do list: approving the budget and presenting the tax levy. Every year, schools throughout the state of Illinois, including Seneca High School, present their tax levy at the December Board of Education meeting. This past year marked the end of a two-year extension of an original seven-year agreement with Exelon, now known as Constellation, on the valuation of the LaSalle Station. Within this agreement, the taxable value of LaSalle station was agreed upon at \$460 million, as well as the pledge to maintain a constant tax rate of \$1.74838 for all district taxpayers. For the original seven years of the agreement, Seneca High School had a property tax rate of \$1.79838, lowering the taxpayer's rate of \$0.05 each year in the two-year extension. With the new tentative five-year agreement effective this year, the taxable value of LaSalle station will increase to \$530 million, again putting the district in the position to decrease your tax rate of \$1.74838 to \$1.72838.

Arriving at the \$1.72838 tax rate can be a bit confusing so I would like to remind you of one of the extra steps Seneca High School takes in the levy process called abatement. Sometime in December, you may read in the local newspaper that the amount of tax dollars the district is requesting is over 19% higher than last year's extension, or the amount of actual dollars received. Please remember that although the district is requesting this amount, we will reduce the levy or "abate" down to the agreed upon final tax rate of \$1.72838. The percentage increase is also higher than previous years because of the increased valuation of the LaSalle station from \$460 to \$530 million. This abatement occurs in the spring, after the district receives its first draft of the extension from the LaSalle and Grundy County Clerks. By levying an amount greater than what we are truly seeking, we can ensure that the "draft" tax rate we receive in the spring is greater than the target and then abate to the precise rate for all taxpayers in the district. This process has been used by our District for the past nine years as part of the agreement with Constellation and rest assured, by the time you receive your tax bill in the mail, your propertyCons tax rate for Seneca High School will be 2 cents less than last year.

There are many factors that contribute to the safety of students and staff while school is in session. The most important factor is something that is referred to over and over in the many training classes I have attended, which is, school culture. There is no doubt that having a school resource officer on campus has a huge impact toward school safety. The relationship that exists between school culture and school safety, in my opinion, is one of the biggest factors in working toward a safer school. Seneca High School creates a culture where students feel safe, supported, engaged, and accepted. Aside from the many sports and activities that students have the opportunity to be part of, administration, faculty, and staff, go to lengths to see everyone feels connected to the school in some way. This is done first through positive and stable relationships with staff, academics, support, expectations, opportunities, and a genuine feeling of being noticed and appreciated. School Culture will not replace a school police officer, safety policies, training, or preparedness, but it is an important factor in fostering a safe learning environment and making you feel at ease when your kids board the bus, or are dropped off at school in the morning.

This past spring Mr. Stecken gave me the task of reviewing our policies, procedures, and safety practices. During the summer a Student Reunification Plan was developed. This is a plan that provides a systematic procedure in reuniting students with parents in the event that we have evacuated to another location. The process of drafting, presenting, and testing the plan by the administration was completed and the plan was adopted. The faculty and staff were trained in October by having a demonstration followed by practical exercises. I feel confident that we will be able to reunite students with parents in a timely manner in the event we have evacuated from our main campus.

I wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season.

The 2022 fall season at Seneca High School has been one of great achievements and Irish Pride. I think what I will remember, most fondly, was the way the community rallied behind our football team in its playoff run as we hosted two home playoff football games this season. While all our activities had great seasons, the full bleachers, community decorations, fireworks, and buzz around this town were all great memories.

- Irish volleyball: Our freshman team went 20-8, our JV team went 25-6, and our varsity team ended its season with an overall record of 18-17. To start the season, the Lady Irish took 2nd place in the Hall Early Bird Tournament with a loss to a talented Fieldcrest team in the championship game. The Lady Irish went 6-2 in conference play. Perhaps most importantly, the Lady Irish volleyball program raised \$4,000 for "Volley for the Cure" children's cancer charities.

Both the girl's team and Austin Aldridge qualified for the state tournament a great accomplishment!
- **Fighting Irish Football**: Our varsity football team had a great season finishing 10-1 for the season. This season's success was made possible by a great buy-in from our team during the offseason. Coach Baker's summer workouts, supplemented by our own football lifts, gave our team an edge on the field. We had a great deal of success:
 - -9-0 Regular Season
 - -Vermillion Valley North Conference Champions
 - -Gave up zero points in conference play
 - -Ranked in the top ten AP poll from week 5 on
 - -Earned 11 positions on the All-Conference teams, out of players from 12 teams being represented from both sides of the conference
 - -JV finished 6-0-2 and greatly improved as the year went along
 - -Fighting Irish junior lineman Chris Peura was named first team All-State!
- Fall Activities: Our cast and crew of the play "Clue" performed before our Senior Citizen night, our junior high feeder districts, and two nights each of nearly 200 seats filled. The kids put a lot of time into this production and did a great job. Additionally (as showcased in Mr. Maierhofer's article), our FFA is off to another great start this year. Meeting the Social-Emotional Needs of Students

The COVID-19 pandemic has had far-reaching effects on children and adolescents. Not only has academic learning been disrupted, but we have also seen a significant impact on students' mental and social-emotional health as well. This is no surprise, as many supports that students rely on were disrupted during the pandemic, including physical access to peers and family members, established daily routines, and community and extracurricular activities. Many students not only faced increased stress and uncertainty but also lost social opportunities to build relationships and interpersonal skills. As much as we are relieved and excited to enter a school year that feels "normal" with the return of our regular schedules and activities, we are also reacting to a significant increase in social-emotional needs among our students. Our student services department has observed higher rates of stress, anxiety, and depression among teens, with deficits in coping skills and emotional regulation skills.

As a result of our increased social-emotional needs, we have begun implementing several initiatives to support student mental health and strengthen coping skills. First, we are thrilled to welcome Samantha Leake, School Social Worker, to our team. Mrs. Leake has already proven to be an invaluable member of the SHS staff. Mrs. Leake's background in school social work and warm personality make her an excellent support for students, and her knowledge of community resources allows her to assist families with seeking support outside of school as well.

Through partnership with our Regional Office of Education, Mrs. Leake and I were pleased to host Parent/Caregiver Education Night in November. Multiple community resources were in attendance to share information with families, including Crossroads Counseling, Illinois Valley Center for Independent Living, TriCounty Opportunities Council, Illinois Valley Counseling Services, and North Central Area Transit. Allison Warren from the ROE gave an informative presentation on recognizing and responding to symptoms of mental health concerns in teens. Ms. Warren provided practical tips for parents on how to talk to their teens about stress, anxiety, depression, and self-harm. This was a worthwhile event, with information that all parents can use as well as in-person connections to outside resources.

To continue our work in this area, Seneca High School, with support from the ROE, has formed a Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) Team. Our team, consisting of multiple staff and community members, is in the process of completing professional development regarding trauma and social-emotional learning. We will then complete a self-assessment to identify our district's strengths and areas of need in eight domains of social-emotional learning. We will use these results to develop a personalized action plan for the district. Through this process, we hope to develop and implement school-wide strategies to provide the social and emotional development of all students. Though there is work to be done, I am excited to work with our team to strengthen the foundation of social-emotional development for our students. I feel fortunate to work with educators who prioritize the mental health of students and provide such a positive environment for students each day.

SHS Strength & Conditioning Update from Mr. Dan Baker

Something that has become a progressively more important part of our Irish Athletics culture at SHS over the last several years is our Strength & Conditioning program. As a graduate of SHS, and now a teacher/coach for the last 13 years, I have seen our weight room go from a dingy and ill-equipped room in the West Campus, to the excellent and well-equipped facility we now have in the new addition to our building. I've seen summer and off-season training sessions go from just a few football players to our weight room being packed with boys and girls from all different sports. The progress to where we are now was a slow and steady build for a while, but things have really taken off in the last few years.

What has led to this strong cultural shift? There are several reasons. First of all, our facilities have definitely improved over the years with top-of-the-line equipment and a weight room that rivals many of the biggest high schools in the state. Also, our sport coaches have grown more and more supportive of their athletes training both in Athletic PE during the school day and outside of school hours. Another beneficial step came when we created a Strength & Conditioning Coach position. This brought unification across all sports, with all athletes being trained in a cohesive fashion rather than randomized training from several coaches. This move also took a lot of burden off the shoulders of sport coaches, allowing them to focus on their highest priorities. The most important reason our Strength & Conditioning program has thrived, though, is simply from the buy-in of our student-athletes. Despite all the previously mentioned steps, nothing would improve without the dedication, time, effort, and leadership put in by our young men and women.

It's certainly nowhere near the only reason, but I truly believe that the improvements made in our training program have contributed to athletic success here at SHS. You can see the role it has played in the health, strength, speed, and athleticism of our athletes, and the wins and accomplishments they are accumulating. By creating an environment in our training where they can compete with each other, as well as themselves, athletes are driven to improve by lifting heavier, jumping higher, running faster, and training harder. They can see tangible evidence of their improvement in all the data we track, driving them to work even harder. It makes me very proud to see a weight room full of boys and girls from all different sports working together in a crowded weight room, all supporting and encouraging each other as one Fighting Irish team! These National Recognition Programs grant underrepresented students with academic honors that can be included on college and scholarship applications and connect students with universities across the country, helping them stand out during the admissions process. Colleges and scholarship programs use these honors to identify students from underrepresented groups through College Board's Student Search Service.

Calvin Maierhofer, Colin Collet, Christopher Poyner, Anna Bruno, Maggie McDonald, and Stephanie Bernhard earned this recognition by excelling on their PSAT/NMSQT, PSAT 10, or AP Exams and in their classrooms. Students who may be eligible have a GPA of 3.5 or higher and have excelled on the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10, or earned a score of 3 or higher on two or more AP Exams; and attend school in a rural area or small town. Eligible students are invited to apply during their sophomore or junior year, and are awarded at the beginning of the next school year.

Seneca FFA Team Third in Nation

The Seneca FFA Landscaping and Nursery/Landscape Career Development team placed third in the country at this year's competition at the National FFA Convention. Calvin Maierhofer placed seventh overall as an individual and earned a scholarship. The other team members were: Ashlin Jackson, 17th; Emma Smith, 24th; and Chris Poyner, 28th. All four ranked "gold." Laura Yegge was the honorary captain of the team.

The CDE had students reveal their knowledge and skills that are needed to be successful in the landscaping and nursery industry. Components of the competition included a written test covering plant science and landscaping knowledge, and identification of over 125 plants and fifty plant disorders. Students were also required to complete several practical skills assessments related to the landscaping industry, including proper and safe equipment usage, patio construction, use of surveying equipment, plant installation, pruning, and plant propagation.

In addition to technical knowledge, the event challenged students' written, verbal, teamwork, and math skills with a series of practicums that required them to communicate with judges face-to-face as they solved problems, worked as a team to solve mathematical landscaping challenges, and composed a business letter to clients.

Team coach and horticulture teacher, Jeff Maierhofer, said, "I am so proud of this team. To rank this high in the country takes weeks of hard work and review. This team had a goal of making it to the National FFA Convention stage, and they accomplished that."

The team advanced to nationals by virtue of winning the state Horticulture Career Development Event last spring. The competition is an extension of the horticulture curriculum at Seneca High School.

The Seneca FFA Attends National Convention

The last week of October saw 33 Seneca FFA members, three advisors, and superintendent Dan Stecken in Indianapolis for the 2022 National FFA Convention and Expo. They were part of an audience of 70,000 FFA members nationwide who were registered for this year's convention. Convention sessions were held at Lucas Oil Stadium in downtown Indianapolis and the huge agricultural Career Expo was held at the convention center. In addition to the many recognitions presented, members listened to the retiring address of the National FFA officers and other guest speakers.

The Seneca FFA was recognized on stage as a 3-Star chapter and Garrett Granby was recognized for receiving the American FFA Degree. The American Degree is the highest level of degree an FFA member can receive and is the culmination of five years of dedication.

Seneca FFA member, Tynan Justice, was one of seventy members that comprised the very exclusive National FFA Band. The "mail order band" came together for the first time on the previous Saturday and melded into a premier unit in just two days.

The Agronomy Career Development Team of Carter Thomas, Erinn Kenney, Kenny Daggett and Addison Steigler placed in the silver division. Members are required to complete a written exam, identify crops, weeds, diseases, insects, and seeds. They were also asked to grade grain, develop a production plan for a crop and present it to judges, and discuss current agronomic issues.

The Nursery/Landscape CDE team of Calvin Maierhofer, Ashlin Jackson, Emma Smith, and Chris Poyner placed a school record high of third. Maierhofer was the seventh highest individual in the country.

FFA members visited the National FFA Center, the Indianapolis Speedway Museum and facilities, the Indiana State Museum, the Indianapolis Zoo and Botanical Gardens, the NCAA Hall of Fame, and Kelsay Farms. A private grounds tour of Victory Field, the triple-A stadium in Indy, was conducted to expose members to careers in turf and sports management. The group also attended the "World's Toughest Rodeo" at the Indiana State Fairgrounds.
