Message from our Superintendent, Dr. Dan Stecken

The Property Tax Levy Process at Seneca High School

Each year in our Fall newsletter, we have written to you about our tax levy process. The process can be confusing and we always want to be as transparent as possible with our community members. Every year, schools throughout the state of Illinois, including Seneca High School, present their annual **TAX LEVY** at the December Board of Education meeting, as required by law. Here at Seneca High School, our Board of Education begins this discussion in October at our first Finance Committee meeting, and then discusses the tax levy openly in October, November, and our December public meetings. If you have kept your property tax bill records over the past decade, you can see that Seneca Township

High School District 160's property tax rate has been reduced the past decade from roughly \$1.80 to \$1.70, representing a significant decrease. Additionally, we carry **ZERO** taxable bonds or interest (which would raise your tax rate) for debt.

A tax **LEVY** is a request for tax dollars. The levy is determined by the simple equation: Tax Rate x EAV (Equalized Assessed Valuation of your property) = Tax Dollars Requested. Within your levy, there are multiple taxing districts that comprise the total tax dollars requested for all taxing bodies. For example, Seneca HS District 160 taxing body represented \$1.72838 of total \$7.129 in last year's total taxable rate.

Arriving at the \$1.70838 tax rate listed above can be a bit confusing, so I would like to remind you of one of the extra steps Seneca High School takes in the levy process called **ABATEMENT**. Annually, in December, featured in The Ottawa Times, you may read that the district's tax dollar request is over 5% higher than last year's property tax levy **EXTENSION**, or the amount of actual dollars received. We call this advertisement the "Black Box" due to its black border in the newspaper. This is also called a **TRUTH IN TAXATION** hearing. Please remember that although the district is requesting this amount, we will always reduce the levy or "**ABATE**" down to the agreed upon final tax rate of \$1.72838. Currently, the district has a 5-year tax agreement with Constellation Energy to keep our maximum tax rate at \$1.72838 through 2026. Seneca High School does not control the assessed value of your home, that lies with your local township assessor and the LaSalle County Assessor's Office, however we do control our property **TAX RATE** requested. Your property tax rate has again been lowered by Seneca High School, representing a pattern over the last ten years, as featured in the chart above.

This abatement process occurs in the spring after the district receives its first draft of the anticipated property tax extension from the LaSalle and Grundy County Clerks. By levying an amount greater than what we are seeking, we can ensure that the "DRAFT" tax rate requested in December's levy, that we receive in the spring, is greater than the intended target. This allows the district to fully capture maximum capped funds in areas like special education and transportation, and then abate to the precise rate for all taxpayers in the district. This process has been used by our District for the past 10+ years as part of the agreement with Constellation Energy's LaSalle Station (as shown in the table above) and rest assured, by the time you receive your tax bill in the mail in June, your property TAX RATE will be LOWER than last year (from \$1.72838 to \$1.70838). In early June, I will again remind you that the tax rate has decreased, but the assessor's office valuation of your property has increased.

Significantly, Seneca High School's property tax rate is substantially lower than every high school district, not only in the county, but also in the greater area. We are proud of the quality educational programming offered to our students and community, while keeping our tax rate for the citizens of Seneca, one of the lowest around, with no taxable debt. As an avid daily reader of The Times, I have noted the many "BLACK BOX" Truth in Taxation advertisements I have seen over the past few weeks in the local newspaper. Again, any time a property taxing body requests 5% more than last year's received extension, a Truth in Taxation hearing must be held and an advertisement in the newspaper must be displayed. The increase in property tax assessments has led most taxing bodies, as required by law, including school districts, fire departments, townships, etc. to list these advertisements in the local newspaper. What is different about Seneca High School District 160 from most of these bodies, is that we will abate our real rate down to \$1.70838 in the Spring.

I encourage anyone who cares about Seneca High School, at any time, to stop in and have a cup of coffee with the Superintendent, strike up a conversation at a game, or to pick up the phone and call 815-357-5000 if you have any questions about anything at Seneca High School. This school year our gymnasium addition project has been rapidly progressing and is getting closer and closer to opening for the 24-25 school year.




















Cactus Program—

We would like to thank the United Way of LaSalle County for their guidance and support in bringing Lucky to Seneca High School.










2023 Fall Athletics:

During the month of September, we highlighted the ways in which Seneca High School demonstrates progressiveness.

• RISE, our school incentive program, was created to help our students achieve the Seneca Way by encouraging them to Be Here, Be Kind, and Be Accountable. While RISE's main focus is to encourage students to improve their academic performance, school attendance, and behavior, building community and culture became a secondary mission. RISE has already hosted several school-wide events this year, many of which were surprises for our students.





• Our co-teaching model benefits all students by reducing the student-to-teacher ratio, reducing stigma, and providing enrichment or reteaching opportunities. Students with disabilities have the combined benefit of access to general education curriculum with a highly qualified content specialist
